School Routines

- Your child will be reading more substantial texts and will generally chose their books independently or with some adult guidance. They must complete a book review before changing their book.
- Reading records are checked regularly during the week to ensure home reading.
- Children will read regularly during the work to an adult with rich questioning about the text.
- Book reviews will earn Bronze, Silver and Gold

High-quality books

We will ensure that your child has a reading book which is suitably pitched to build both confidence as a reader and their fluency. Books may also be chosen to widen their knowledge about a topic or area of study.

Within our English lessons, our scheme provides lessons based on high quality texts with a rich vocabulary.

Your child will also visit our school library and read a free-choice library book for enjoyment. Allowing children free choice helps them to develop their identities as a reader as they learn which books/ authors they like and which they do not.

Supporting your child

- Continue to read with your child and question them about their reading. Ensure your child reads for at least 20 mins a day.
- Log your child's reading in their Reading Record so that they can access school rewards. Check they are logging their own independent reading
- Make reading time pleasurable by providing a quiet, comfortable space with minimal distractions
- Ask your child simple questions as they read to check their understanding
- Use positive language and praise their reading efforts
- Read to your child as part of your mornina or evening routine. This builds vocabulary, feeds imagination and can even improve sleep patterns
- Ask them about books/ stories they are reading at school (your child's class books are shared on the half termly overviews)
- Model by reading your own books/texts as a household. Have reading time
